This Code is a guideline and baseline for examining the professional activities of MSS members. The Code also recognizes that MSS members need to adhere to the high standards of collegiality. Members of the MSS strive to eliminate bias in their professional activities, and they do not tolerate any forms of discrimination based on age, gender, race, socioeconomic status or origin, ethnicity, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, disability, health conditions, political affiliation, marital status, domestic status, parental status, or any other applicable basis proscribed by law. As a regional association, we place value on dismantling power inequalities. We engage and respect diverse experiences through all our programmatic activities and in the business of the Society.

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WELCOME

Thank you for joining us for the 2024 Midwest Sociological Society Annual Meeting. This is our 87th meeting, and this year, we return to our MSS roots by gathering in Des Moines, the site of the first MSS annual meetings from 1937-1947. Thanks to the hard work of the 2024 Program Committee, MSS staff, and hundreds of submissions from our members, we have a fantastic program this year full of excellent presentations, panels, and workshops, amazing plenary speakers, new events and opportunities, and some favorite MSS traditions. We are so glad you are here!

This year's theme focuses on finding a Sociology of Joy, which centers joy and pleasure in our research, teaching, and practice. Joy has become a buzzword in the media and popular culture, but joy has long been acknowledged by scholars and activists as a form of healing and resistance. Until recently, joy has largely been missing from sociological study and discourse, but understanding how we find and create joy and pleasure is essential for creating a better world. This year's theme asks how we as sociologists can balance our ongoing analysis of the roots of inequality and oppression with a fuller consideration of the necessity and foundations of joy, pleasure, and resistance.

Our plenary speakers have taken up this charge, and we are thrilled they will be sharing their work and insights with us. On Friday, Drs. Laurel Westbrook (Grand Valley State University) and Stef Shuster (Michigan State University) will present, "Reducing the Joy Deficit in Sociology: Why You Should Care About Transgender Joy." On Saturday, Dr. Antar Tichavakunda (University of California, Santa Barbara) will present "The Potential of a Sociology of Joy: Studying the "Something Else" of Life." We are also happy to once again partner with the Society for the Study of Symbolic Interaction (SSSI) for the annual Peter Hall Lecture. This year's presentation by Dr. Nancy Berns is titled, "Defending Grief, Protecting Joy: Strategies, Cautionary Tales, and Hope." Finally, in the spirit of resistance and community building, we are pleased that Dr. Meg Krausch will offer two workshops during the conference on using your existing skills and networks to help Defend Trans Life.

We also want to make your annual meeting experience a joyful one, and will be adding a few new activities and events to the program along with several of your regular favorites. First, visit the Sociology of Joy board in the Commons to share what brings you joy or what you find joyful about Sociology. Thursday evening we welcome you back with music and refreshments at the Welcome Reception. In addition, please join us for Trivia Night (Thursday evening) as well as the Ice Cream Social (Friday afternoon), Presidential Reception (Friday evening), and Queer Mixer (Saturday evening). Saturday night from 8-10pm we will host Game Night, an evening of board games, cards, and good conversation. We also offer opportunities for self care during the conference, including a morning run, guided meditation, and a quiet space.

We want to thank Aaron Puhmann and the Local Arrangements Committee for putting together a Guide to Des Moines for you this year, with information about where to find coffee, great food, and local resources. The LAC has also organized some fantastic tours connected to our themes of joy, creativity, and resistance, including the Iowa Capitol and Dome, Des Moines Art Center, and the Jordan House Museum (part of the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Program).

We are gathered on the traditional lands of the Báxoje (Bah Kho-je) or Ioway, Sauk (Sac), and Meskwaki (Fox) peoples, whose homelands were lost in a series of treaties and whose ancestors were forcibly removed to Kansas and Nebraska. As we come together to share our work and ideas for how to understand and better our social world, we must acknowledge the ongoing exclusion and erasure of Indigenous peoples. Indeed many of the institutions in which we work and learn are built on stolen land and have directly benefited from this erasure. We encourage you to learn more about these Nations and identify ways to support their work. You can find more information in the meeting app.

Finally, I want to thank all of those whose hard work and vision made this conference possible. Thank you to all the student directors for their ideas and feedback, and especially to Elisabeth Benteman for taking the lead on student programs. Many thanks to Jennifer Talarico for her brilliant ideas as well as her patience and positive attitude, and to the amazing Sadie Pendaz-Foster, who somehow manages to do the work of 3 productive humans all by herself. And finally, thank you to all the MSS members, volunteers, board members, and committees who give their time and energy to our incredible organization.

Tour the Iowa state capitol building, a site of the continuing struggle for equality and justice in Iowa. Built between 1871 and 1886, the Iowa State Capitol is the only five-domed state capitol building in the country, and the primary dome offers a spectacular view of Des Moines. Inside, the building features works of art, fixtures, and carvings in both wood and stone. The State Law Library is housed in the capitol and is in the Victorian style with iron staircases reaching the five tiers.

From 1810 to 1850, an estimated 100,000+ enslaved African Americans seized freedom through the Underground Railroad, a network of people, routes, and safe places guiding their escape from enslavement. The Jordan House Museum is part of the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Program and the Iowa John Brown Freedom Trail. In this Victorian house museum tour, learn about Iowa history and James Jordan, an abolitionist and “chief conductor” of the underground railroad in the area. Limited accessibility: the basement and 2nd floor are only accessible by stairs, and the Underground Railroad exhibit is in the basement.

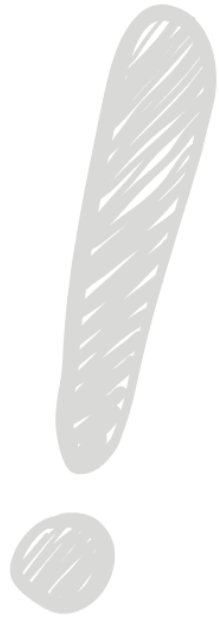

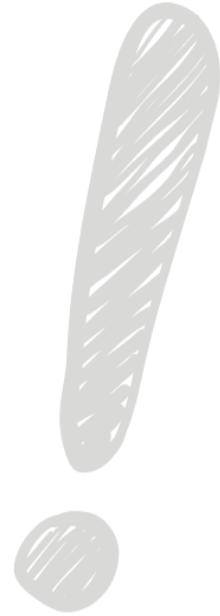

Zines (short, often self-published, or handmade magazines) continue to benefit from a resurgent interest, including in classrooms. As early as the 1930s but coming to popularity in the 1970s and 80s in the punk and "DIY" scene, zines have been a pop culture phenomenon that allows anyone to become physical content creators. Zines can be a platform for nuanced teaching and creative projects to reinforce learning outcomes. Creating zines as an assignment presents students with the opportunity to demonstrate research and writing skills, exercise creativity, connect with joy, and express compassion and empathy. The workshop will draw from *Doing Public Scholarship: A Practical Guide to Media Engagement* (Routledge, 2024). A basic premise of public scholarship is making academic work and related ideas accessible and available to publics. Media engagement, whether interviews with news journalists, or the use of hashtags, is a necessary feature of any public scholarship. Media formats play a fundamental and interactive role in how people ultimately come to view and understand the social world. The question is not whether scholars should engage with media but how to do so. Drawing on fifteen years of experience that includes hundreds of print, radio, and television news interviews, dozens of published opinion pieces, and the use of social media for public engagement, this workshop, outlines a practical, easy-to-follow approach to doing public sociology in media that consists of, and brings together, interrelated forms of media engagement. This workshop also offers some advice pertaining to career advancement and provides strategies to avoid negative experiences.

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DEANNA SMITH

GRADUATE INSTITUTION: UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN, ANN ARBOR

DeAnna Smith is a PhD candidate in sociology at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. She earned her BA in sociology at Northwestern University, and her MA in sociology at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. Smith's research interests include surveillance, punishment, race, class, gender, and the family. Her dissertation, *Three Papers on Families Navigating Surveillance and Punishment after Prison*, investigates how formerly incarcerated women and their families traverse the tumultuous and ever-evolving landscape of surveillance and punishment after incarceration. Her dissertation draws on interviews with formerly incarcerated women, their family members, and their parole agents, as well as 11 months of participant observation with women as they navigate reentry services in Chicago. Through articles on technological advancements in state surveillance, personal responsibility, and housing insecurity, Smith shows how formerly incarcerated women, and their families, resist surveillance and try to rebuild their families after incarceration, while parole agents and re-entry actors generate new logics that justify widening and deepening the net of surveillance and punishment. Her research has been supported by the Ford Foundation Predoctoral Fellowship, University of Michigan's Institute for Research on Women and Gender (IRWG), and University of Michigan's Center for the Education of Women (CEW+). Thus far, her work has been published in *Contexts* and the *Annual Review of Sociology*. Outside of research and teaching, Smith enjoys traveling, practicing yoga, creating pottery, and reading mystery and thriller novels.
