Welcome to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the "Genuine American City" located on the shores of Lake Michigan and best known for its famous breweries! Milwaukee is rich in historical and cultural attractions including the newly expanded Milwaukee Art Museum (don't miss our tour!), the grand Pabst Mansion, and the Miller Brewing Company.

The theme of this year's meeting is "Globalization: Promises, Possibilities, and Pitfalls." We will explore how globalization is fundamentally altering our lives and social institutions and how it is impacting inequality and social change. Highlighting the program are two keynote addresses. The first is by Rae Lesser Blumberg (University of Virginia) whose talk is entitled "The Created Biology of Gender Stratification: From Hunter-Gatherers to Low Educated Male Workers." The second keynote is by Elizabeth Heger Boyle (University of Minnesota) whose talk is entitled "Human Rights in American Sociology: A Case of U.S. Exceptionalism." Our program theme is further represented by nine thematic and several paper and roundtable sessions.

When the Program Committee chose the conference theme, we had no idea that the already relevant topic would become even more so. After the presidential election, the Program Committee went to work putting together a Town Hall meeting and paper sessions on the Trump Presidency adding to similarly-themed papers and sessions already submitted to the program. MSS Past President Doug Hartmann (University of Minnesota) and the MSS Secretary Lee Miller (Sam Houston State) are organizing a Town Hall meeting around the Trump Presidency. Michele Lamont (Harvard University), American Sociological Association President, will lead that Town Hall with "Trump Presidency: What's Going to Happen to the Social Sciences?"

Every meeting room in the hotel is occupied. We have approximately 86 paper sessions, 16 workshops, and 15 panels. Our program has several other events including:

- MSS Teaching Certificate and AKD Teaching Workshop
- Trivia Night
- Three Tours
- 1. Growing Power: tour of a non-profit urban farm including demonstrations of using worms to consume waste, fish to fertilize plants, and honeybees to pollinate.
- 2. Milwaukee Pub Crawl: tour of multiple bars near the conference hotel including opportunities to indulge in Wisconsin cheeses and sausages.
- 3. Milwaukee Art Museum: tour of galleries including one of the largest collections by Georgia O'Keeffe and exhibitions that include contemporary uses of paper, European interpretations of classic mythology, and photography by Helen Levitt.
- Commons area – which will have exhibits from state sociological societies, publishers, and nonprofits. The ice cream social will also take place here.

Thanks to the Program Committee, our awesome Student Director Meggan Lee, our outstanding Meeting Savvy guru Sadie Pendaz-Foster and the ever-diligent Executive Director Jennifer Talarico without whom this quality and hopefully inspiring and useful conference could not have taken place.

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An annual conference of the Society for the Study of Symbolic Interaction

Symbolic Interactionism is a sociological perspective with its roots in early 20th Century developments: the pragmatist philosophy of George Herbert Mead and a program of ethnographic research on social life in Chicago. Since Herbert Blumer coined the term “Symbolic Interactionism” eighty years ago, the tradition gained prominence both as a distinct sociological perspective and by exporting many of its best ideas into mainstream sociology and other social sciences. Over the course of the 20th Century, Symbolic Interactionism produced some of the most important ethnographic research in sociology, developed a prominent structural branch, and survived intellectual challenges from both positivism and postmodernism.

Now, nearly two decades into the 21st Century, Symbolic Interactionism continues to produce outstanding intellectual work, but faces challenges old and new to its place in the discipline of sociology and beyond. In this Symposium we take stock of where we stand and showcase exceptional work—theoretical and empirical—much of it produced by scholars who received their Ph.D.s since the dawn of this century.

The Society for the Study of Symbolic Interaction is an international community of scholars whose scholarship employs and examines the perspective of Symbolic Interactionism. The Society publishes a quarterly journal, *Symbolic Interaction*, which was founded in 1977.

The Couch-Stone Symposium is one of two annual meetings of SSSI (the other being held simultaneously with ASA). It was named for two interactionist sociologists who were instrumental in founding SSSI, both scholars at Midwestern universities: Carl Couch (University of Iowa) and Gregory Stone (University of Minnesota). The original symposium, called the “Minnesota Symposium on Symbolic Interaction,” was held in Stone’s home in June 1974.
