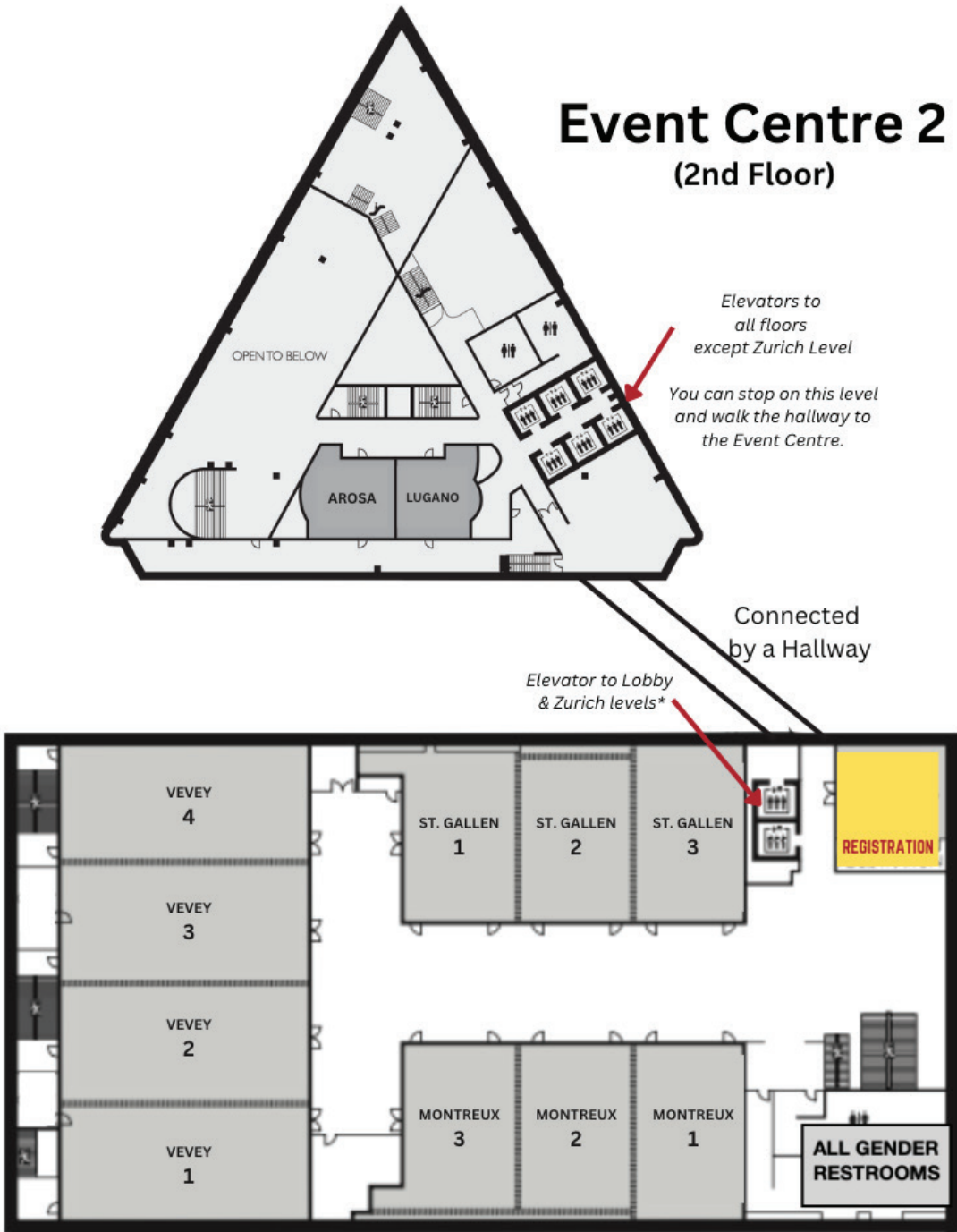

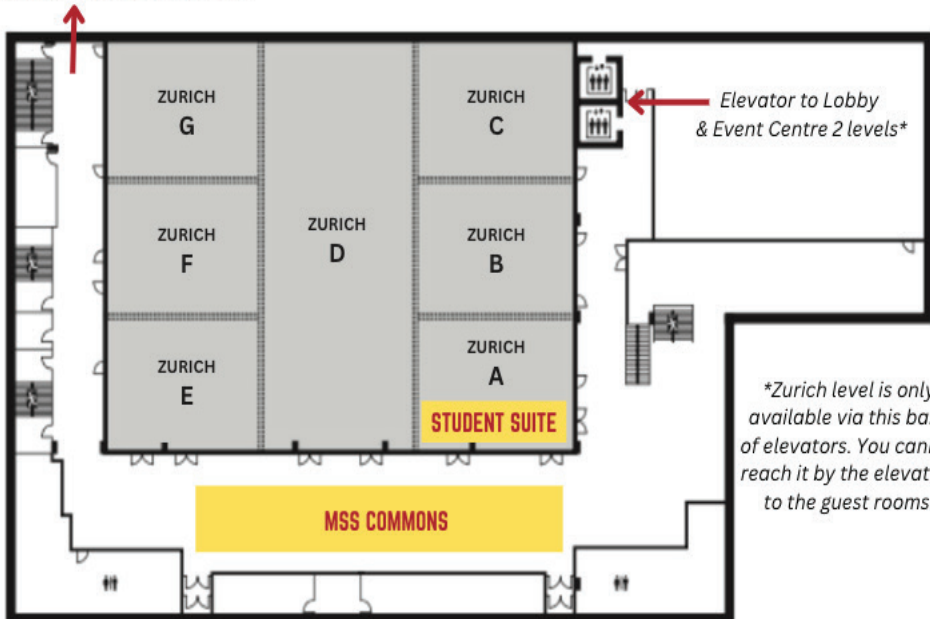

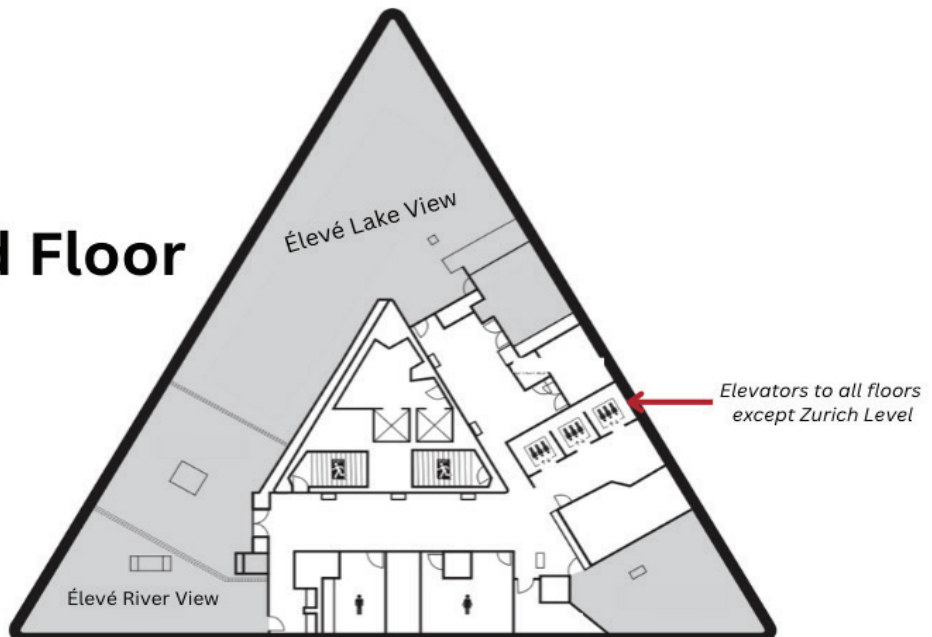


Zurich Level

As a regional association, we place value on dismantling power inequalities. We engage and respect diverse experiences through all our programmatic activities and in the business of the Society.

The Discovery Partners Institute empowers people to jumpstart their tech careers or companies in Chicago. It is led by the University of Illinois System in partnership with top research universities. DPI does three things: train people for high-demand tech jobs, conduct applied R&D, and business building to grow Chicago's tech ecosystem. DPI's programs work with children and adults to increase Chicago's tech talent supply and drive equitable economic growth.

DPI's Pritzker Tech Talent Labs is focused on building a deeper and more diverse tech talent workforce in Illinois. This includes computer science and tech-focused programming for middle school, high school, community college, 4-year and graduate student learners, K-12 teachers, as well as workforce and upskilling programs, including apprenticeship programs.

Mark Harris is the tour guide and leads the Pritzker Tech Talent Labs. He will give us a tour of DPI's space at 200 South Wacker and then discuss the purpose, goals, and strategies of its educational arm and explain why the University of Illinois, the City of Chicago, and the State of Illinois are making such an investment in the institute.

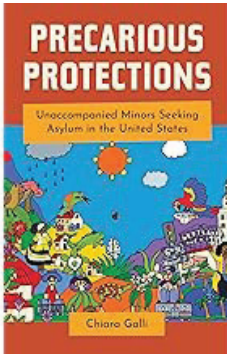

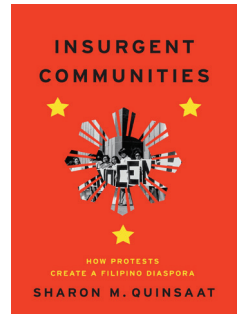

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2025 MSS CERTIFICATES

The **MSS-AKD TEACHING CERTIFICATE** is a certification program organized by the MSS Teaching and Learning Committee in conjunction with AKD. The program provides a structure for you to focus your conference participation around university issues related to, or that impact, undergraduate teaching and learning in sociology (i.e. teaching and learning, race and ethnicity, gender studies). To receive the MSS-AKD Teaching Certificate, you must attend five sessions, at least one of which being a highlighted AKD session (verified by a signature from the session organizer at the end of each session you attend), and write a brief reflection on your learning. There are multiple qualifying sessions in many time slots that demonstrate the importance of this theme throughout the conference.

Before you leave the conference, you must turn in your roster and feedback at the registration desk during desk hours. Alternately, you may send materials to Doug Valentine, committee chair, via email at drv8d@missouri.edu no later than April 15, 2025. After committee review, you will be emailed a certificate that you can include on your vitae or share with those who supported your attendance at the conference. Thank you for participating.

The **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CERTIFICATE** is a credential organized by the MSS Professional Development Committee. This certificate provides a structure to organize your conference participation around academic issues related to graduate school, academic careers, careers outside of academia, and topics concerned to sociology as a discipline. By completing the certification process you will be able to document, and will be recognized for, your attendance and participation in these sessions.

For you to receive the MSS Professional Development Certificate, you need to attend 5 sessions (verified by a signature from the session organizer at the end of each session you attend) and write a brief reflection on your learning. In this session, Chicago-based social justice artist, Tonika Lewis Johnson and University of Illinois Chicago sociologist Maria Krysan discuss their recently published co-authored book, “Don’t GoStories of Segregation and How to Disrupt It” (Polity 2024), with a focus on how it can be used in high school and college classrooms to engage students in discussions about race, place, and residential segregation. The premise of the book is the simple yet powerful message repeated hundreds of times a day in cities around the world“don’t go” – avoid at all costs those Black and Brown disinvested neighborhoods that have become bywords for social disorder and urban decay. The book is a collection of short and accessible stories (and photos) told to the authors—a Black artist and a White academic—by everyday Chicagoans. They paint a rich picture of life in a segregated city with candor, humor, heartbreaking tales, and novel ideas and can spur conversations about the devastating consequences of racial segregation and disinvestment as well as simple actions that push back against racism and ‘place-ism’. While providing personal stories to create connection and empathy around the dangers and damage caused by the Don’t Go message, it also offers hope and optimism through the ways in which the storytellers have pushed back against the messages.

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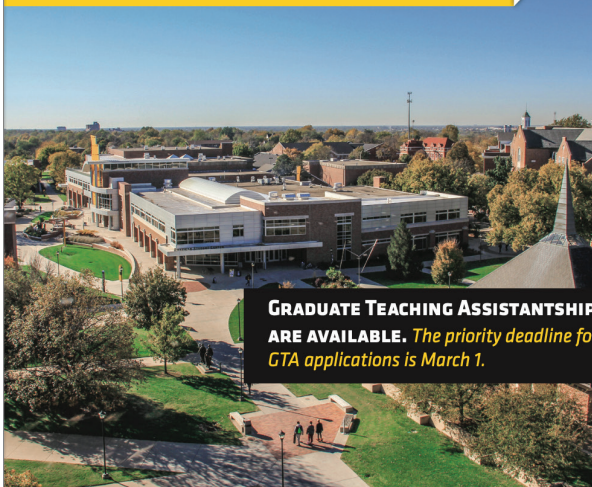
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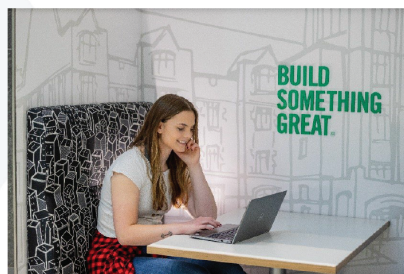


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
